With my professional background in and business, I have already been in demand to lecture to students at the College and I have presented the College's first year Business Studies NVQ students with a lecture on Distribution. This was new territory for me. I never thought I'd find myself giving lectures in college as opposed to receiving them! However I've got plenty to say on the subject of business and it's great that the students are so willing to learn.

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It is a great honour and privilege to have been invited to be the Presiding Fellow of Suffolk New College and I am thoroughly looking forward to getting stuck in to my new role.
